SEATTLE CENTER/SPACE NEEDLE

- Site of the 1962 World's Fair and home of the iconic Space Needle, the Seattle Center offers events for every taste, from the Seattle Opera to the Pacific Science Center to concerts at Key Arena. www.seattlecenter.com

PIKE PLACE MARKET

- The "Soul of Seattle", the Market has operated on nine acres since August 17, 1907. Founded by eight farmers who were met that day by 10,000 eager shoppers, it's grown into a Seattle institution—and a must-see for visitors. www.pikeplacemarket.org

SEATTLE AQUARIUM

- If you're lucky, you might catch a glimpse of some of Puget Sound's three orca pods while in town. But for a close-up look at all kinds of aquatic life, visit the recently renovated (2007) and expanded aquarium, the 7th largest in the US. www.seattleaquarium.org

SEATTLE ART MUSEUM

- The first US stop on the recent Picasso exhibit, SAM (as it is called) greets visitors with its 48-foot statue of the Hammering Man. www.seattleartmuseum.org

WESTLAKE CENTER

- In addition to housing the south terminus for the famous Seattle Monorail (ride it to the base of the Space Needle), Westlake Center offers many fine retail options. www.westlakecenter.com

How to Get Around



BY BUS

- Surface buses within the downtown Seattle corridor (between Battery Street on the north and Jackson Street on the south) are free. You can climb aboard and explore downtown or catch a ride back to the hotel after dinner.
- Seattle also has a downtown bus tunnel connecting the north and south ends of downtown. The bus tunnel has five stops, including one conveniently located beneath Westlake Center. It's a safe and handy alternative to getting around town.

BY MONORAIL

- The Seattle Center Monorail is the nation's first full-scale commercial monorail system and provides a fun, quick and convenient link between downtown and the Seattle Center. The trains, which depart every 10 minutes, traverse the one mile route in about 2 minutes. Round-trip tickets are \$4 for adults, \$1.50 for kids.

BY TROLLEY

- Established in 1982, the Seattle waterfront trolley runs 1.75 miles along Alaskan Way and the Elliott Bay waterfront. The \$1 fare allows you to get on and off at any stop over a 90-minute period. The trolley runs every 20 minutes between 7 am and 6:30 pm.

SIGNATURE SEATTLE

- ◇ **Ivar's Original Acres of Clams**—Famous for its “Keep Clam” advertisements featuring dancing mollusks. Since 1938, Ivar's has offered full service seafood on Seattle's Historic Pier 54, offering panoramic views of Puget Sound.
